This past April, cadets from the University of South Florida's (USF) Arnold Air Society (AAS) had the honor of attending this year's conclave, ATLANTACON, in Atlanta, GA. It was hosted by a joint NATCON Staff, comprised of Northern Arizona University, UNC-Chapel Hill, Georgia Tech, and Fayetteville State University.

As the premier annual gathering for AAS and Silver Wings, NATCON serves as a powerful launchpad for professional development, leadership immersion, and nationwide advocacy.

The USF delegation proudly represented both AFROTC Detachment 158 and the Waterman-Twining Chapter of the Air & Space Forces Association (AFA), a relationship grounded in mutual support and a shared commitment to developing future Air and Space Force leaders.
